During the 2nd ID meeting (May 22-24, Cape Town), Accountability International and ID Meeting participants conducted a stakeholder mapping exercise for the Challenging Criminalisation Globally project and for partners work on criminalisation. We placed a focus on those that have not been brought into the CCG project and/ or movement.

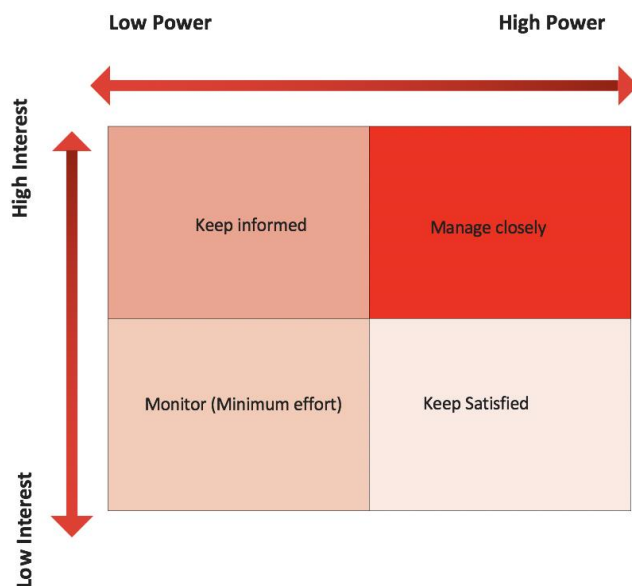
Particularly, the **aim** of the stakeholder analysis was to **contribute to the CCG project objectives**.

Objective 1: Mobilise a critical mass of stakeholders to advance a global discourse on the impact of penal provisions on the achievement of the end of the AIDS epidemic and the achievement of the SDGs.

Objective 2: Support communities and activists in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean taking actions to challenge criminal provisions on identity, morality, sexuality and bodily autonomy.

Objective 3: Provide platforms for evidence-based engagement and dialogue between government representatives, policymakers and civil society organisations using regional inter-governmental mechanisms.

The stakeholder mapping aims to identify existing platforms, movements, and stakeholders with whom we can engage, and which can play a role in terms of achieving a critical mass aimed to challenging criminalisation beyond the existing actors and contacts. This approach will allow us to bring the so-called *'unusual suspects'* to the challenging criminalization movement. Additionally, it could also contribute to supporting communities in the Global South in terms of taking various actions to challenge criminal provisions on identity, morality, sexuality and bodily autonomy.



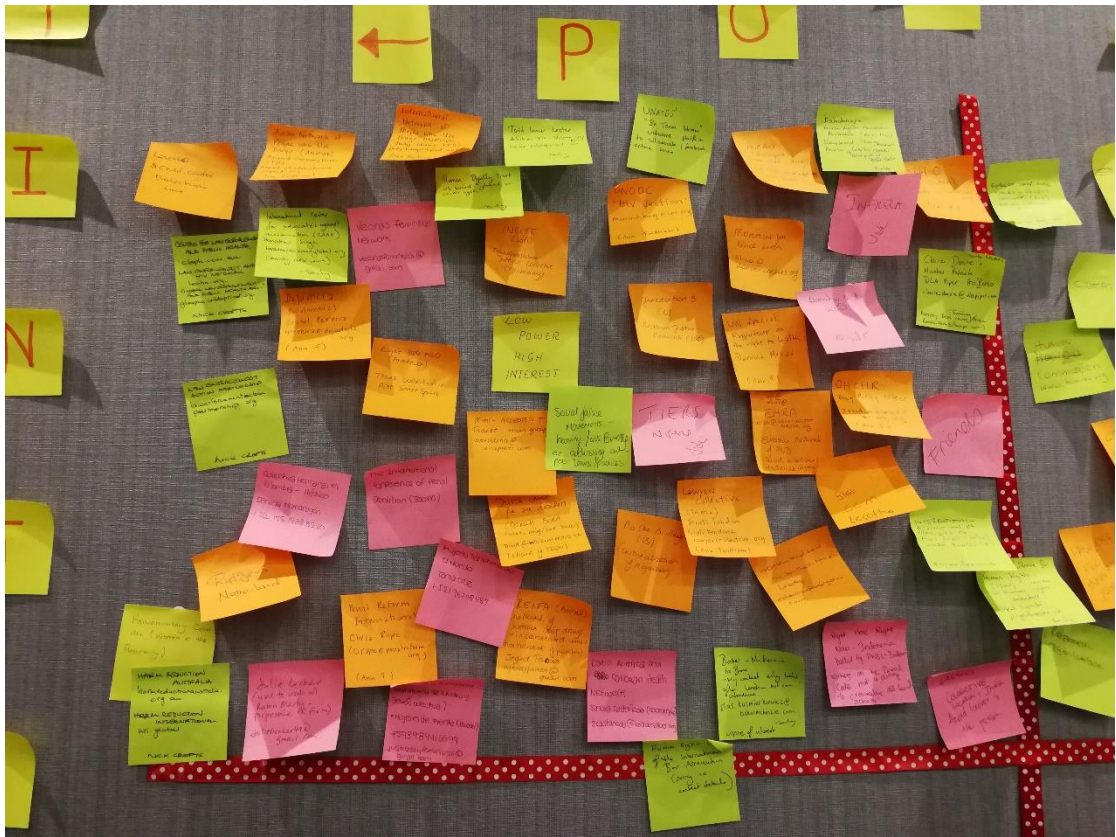
METHODOLOGY

Accountability International used a simple method which analyses stakeholders by their power and interest.

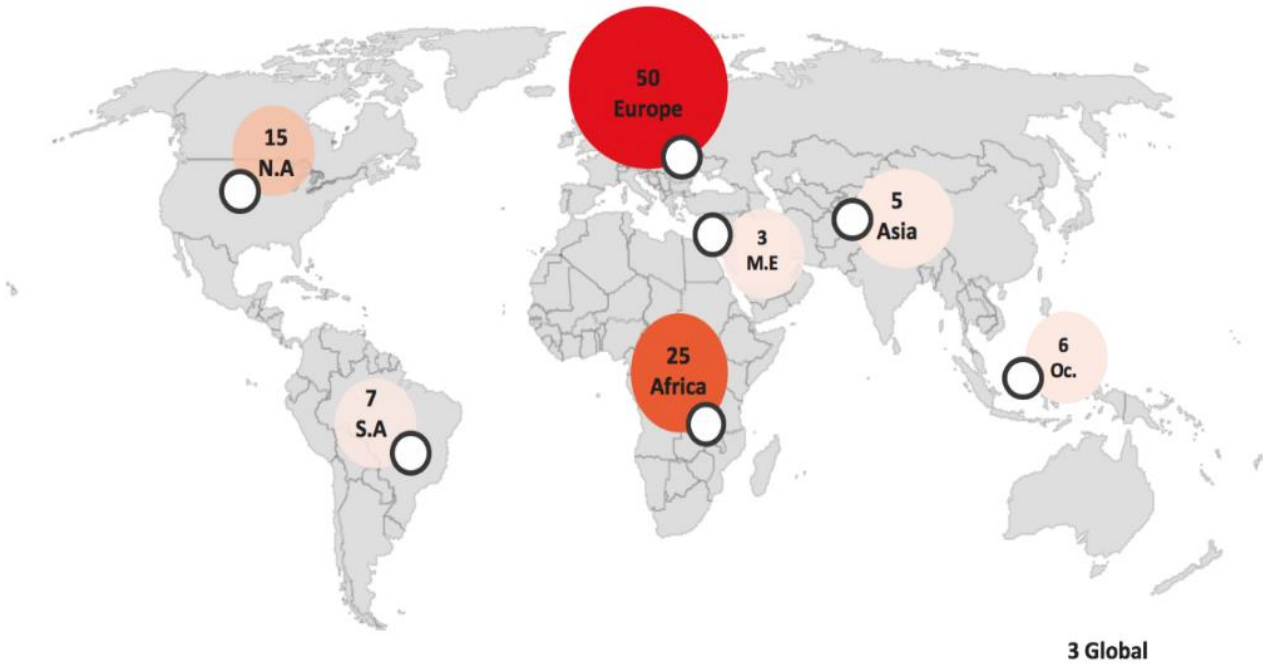
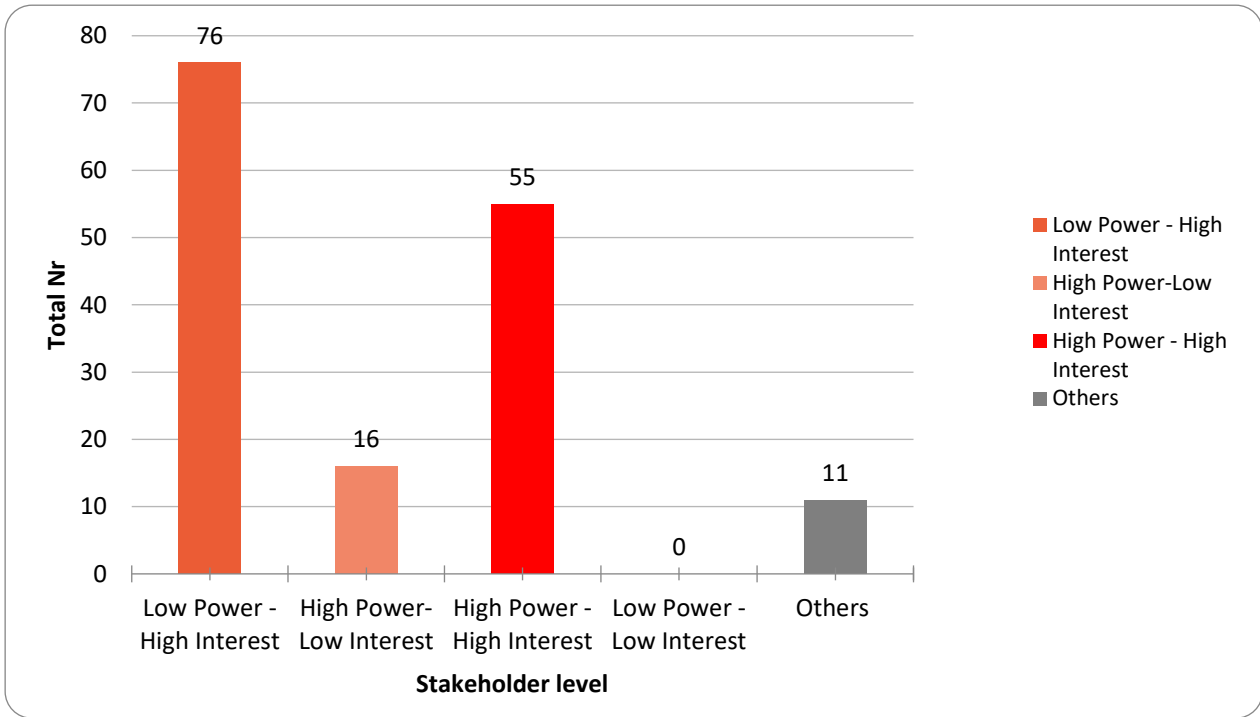
Participants were requested to add names of individuals and organisations to the power/interest map.

3. Low Power, High Interest.
4. Low Power, Low Interest.
